## Tracking Progress in Land Policy, Strategy and Action Plan: Case of Algeria, Burundi, Chad, Senegal and Cote D'ivoire

## **SUMMARY**

Through the LPI, a joint initiative was undertaken by the African Union Commission (AUC), United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) and the African Development Bank (AfDB), important actions and measures have been launched including a series of regional studies on land issues across Africa accompanied by rigorous consultations and discussions at regional and continental levels. During the whole process, the immediate and urgent need to develop and implement a tracking system to monitor land policy formulation and implementation has been underlined in bold. Subsequently, the LPI produced a series of documents and consultation papers on land issues and policy monitoring.

After describing need and importance of tracking progress in land policy, this paper aims through Land Project case studies to discuss tenure régimes and how far Algeria, Burundi, Chad, Senegal and Cote d'Ivoire, are developing and implementing Land Policy Reform. The paper aims to study credible indicators and draw key lessons from Land projects. Finally the paper aims to summarize recommendations and describe actions and measures necessary to implement the process and guarantee the sustainability of the proposed system.
